What was happening here 68 years ago

Noted below are news items originally published in local papers in the latter part of March 1948:

- The Marshallton School PTA sponsored a meeting with a large number of West Bradford residents to discuss the reorganization of the township's school system. Much attention was focused on which high school—Downingtown, Coatesville or West Chester—township youngsters should attend. The township school board was requested to hire a University of Pennsylvania Education group to study the issue.
- Downingtown's **Health Board** initiated an investigation of who was responsible for the accumulation of garbage and refuse in the mill race, which travelled under stores on East Lancaster Avenue in the borough's business district, and ultimately collected at the Bicking Paper Co., located at the rear of the Downingtown National Bank's main office.
- Girl Scout Troop 10 celebrated its 10th anniversary at a party at Marshallton School. Members of the troop who participated in games such as "Clumps," "Cootie," and "George Washington Crossing the Delaware" at the party included Verna and Jo-Ann Woodward, Bunny Bunting, Patty Bittle, Caroline Ferri, June Ellingsworth, Didi Wilson, Edith Albertson, Mary Brackbill, Jennie Thompson, Carlene Yetter, Shirley Lamborn, Mary-Jane Place, Jo-Ann LeFevre, Doris Cann, Lee Ashby and Edith Smyers.
- The Ladies Working Guild at **Central Presbyterian Church**, Downingtown, baked 140 pies of many varieties in the church kitchen early one morning and quickly sold them all. The committee responsible for the project included Mrs. Earl Garrison, Mrs. Frank McCorkle and Mrs. George Holcombe.
- Members of the cast in the **DHS senior play**, "Don't Take My Penny," included Marie Cozzone, Ruth Schrumpf, Phil Burns, Duane Chesney, Charles Pollock, Marjorie Lyons, Virginia and Thomas Bare, Frances DiPietro, Richard Warren, Rena Eachus, Frank Pomento, Betty Moore, Jane Wallace, Dorothy Perley, Frank Wagoner and A.C. Hammons. Special music was performed between acts by vocalist Elsie Manetta and trumpeter Peter Edgar.
- Sixth graders at **West Ward School** in Downingtown, who performed in an operetta, were Dick Goudie, Chaddie Campbell, Dottie Kipp, June Oliver, Helen Jane Henry, Elmer Esworthy, Raymond Thompson, Billie Osborne, Esther Flowers, Teresa Ciarlone, Richard Valentino, Fay Bousum, Shirley Cumens, Bob Plank, and Nancy Yohn.
- DHS seniors who received \$25 awards from the **DHS Alumni Association** were Beverly Chandler and Duane Chesney. The awards were presented at the organization's annual banquet, which was attended by 425 alums. The association voted to have a bronze plaque that memorialized the DHS boys, who were killed in World War II, installed in the junior-senior high school on Manor Avenue.
- Students at **Indiantown School** in Glen Moore who served on the safety patrol, were Joaquin Matlack, Amos Ammon, Howard Arters, Shirley Hannum and Arthur Miller. They were supervised by teacher Mary Eppiheimer.
- Soloists who performed at the DHS spring concert included Janet Kriebel, Frank DiSilvestro, Annabelle Warnick and William Cole.
- Members of **Downingtown Methodist Church**, whose altar and pulpit furniture donations, were given in memory of loved ones who were killed in World War II, were dedicated at a special service, included: Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Pickell, a pulpit; Bertha Thayssen, a pulpit Bible; Mr. and Mrs. William Kline, a communion table; and Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Brownback, an altar cross and candlestick holders,

What local folks were talking about in May 1930

Noted below are news items originally published in the *Downingtown Archive* 86 years ago:

- The **Roosevelt Theatre** on Brandywine Avenue, Downingtown, had begun giving Personal Beauty Ware pieces to women who attended a movie on a Wednesday or Thursday night. The free pieces included a dressing comb, brush, mirror and "all the necessary manicuring and toilette articles for the lady's boudoir."
- **Samuel Banghart**, an 85-year-old Civil War veteran participated in the Downingtown's Memorial Day parade, as the last surviving member of the local GAR Post, which he had founded. He enlisted in the Union Army as a drummer boy when he was 16, and subsequently served as an infantryman until 1865.
- Many local residents only had to pay \$3.50 to take advantage all summer of the recreational activities offered by the **YMCA Camp**, located just south of the borough border. The camp included six two-story cottages and six bungalows, both of which had electric lights; the weekly rate for lodging was \$7, excluding meals. There also was a cement, outdoor swimming pool and a bathhouse, four tennis courts, and a recreation hall. Also, Camp Dwight, for boys between 11 and 16, and Camp Castle, for young kids, were Additional facilities opened for the first time.

- In addition to shoe repairs, **Joseph Mfauewd** offered cleaning and blocking of hats at his shop at 114 E. Lancaster Avenue.
- An altar frontal, designed by parishioner Gilbert McIlvaine and executed by a firm in London, was presented by Mr. and Mrs. Noll in memory of their daughter, Ruth, to **St. James Episcopal Church** in Downingtown. And proceeds from several performances of an operetta, starring St. James members, were used to pay for painting of the parish house's interior.
- The **Downingtown Rotary Club** established a foundation to help worthy DHS grads pay for their college education.
- Members of **St. Anthony's Lodge** and their families in Downingtown celebrated St. Anthony's Day by having an Italian band from South Philadelphia play several concerts over the weekend in the Johnsontown section of the borough, and enjoyed a fireworks display on Saturday night.
 - The grand prize at the **Minquas Fire Co.** carnival was \$100 in gold.
- Mrs. A. Lee Miller opened the **Brandywine Tea Room** at 103 Brandywine Ave. in the borough. Another new eating establishments was J. F. McInerney's White **House Inn**, on Route 30 in the Whitford area.

St. Anthony's is participating in our Restaurant Raffle

St. Anthony's Restaurant one of the nine popular, Downingtown area eating establishments participating in the Historical Society's fourth annual "A Taste of Chester County" Restaurant Raffle. St. Anthony's Restaurant, located at St. Anthony's Lodge, 259 W. Church St, in the Johnsontown section of the borough, offers a little taste of Italy in your back yard. The restaurant has been operated since 2012 by Rose Mascherino Ciarlone, who's carrying on a family tradition since her father was a waiter there many years ago. The Lodge, which has over 2,000 members, will celebrate its 100th anniversary in 1919. And its leaders include fourth generation persons who are taking over the club's management.

In addition to the many traditional Italian favorites such as homemade pasta, meatballs, gnocchis, crepe lasagna, soups and sauces on the dinner menu, customers rave about unusual items, such as: the vegetable risotto, calamari, and pumpkin raviolis.

The restaurant, which is open to the public from 5-9 PM on Tuesday through Saturday and from 3-8 PM on Sunday. Reservations can be made by calling 610-269-9039.

Besides hosting private parties and group dinners in the Lodge's second floor banquet hall, which has a capacity of 150 people, the restaurant recently started offering line dancing (only \$10 at the door) every Wednesday night, 7-8 PM for lessons and 8-10 PM for dancing.

Pat Butler explains how Fire Department's alarm system worked

When Pat Butler, longtime firefighter for the Alerts, saw the photo of the Pennsylvania House demolition in the October 20 Hist-O-Gram, he immediately noticed the Gamewell fire alarm box attached to a utility pole in the picture. The Downingtown Fire Department used the Gamewell system from the late 1920s until 1985.

In addition to the one in front of the Pennsylvania House, the alarm boxes also were located in the 1960s and 1970s at Center Square (intersection of Lancaster and Brandywine Avenues), old St Joseph's Catholic School and Beaver Creek School on West Pennsylvania Avenue, the junior high school (now the STEM Academy) and the senior high school on Manor Avenue, and East Ward School on East Lancaster Avenue.

Pat explained how that alarm system worked in an email to the Historical Society:

If someone activated the alarm, a loud bell would sound at each fire station in town, in addition to the horns at Borough Hall.

Pat now owns the box that had been in front of the old St Joseph's Catholic School. That was Box 312. So when someone pulled that alarm, it was activated and the bells at both fire houses in town would sequentially ring 3 times, 1 time and 2 times. The same sequence would be heard

throughout town from the horns at Borough Hall.

The photo on the left shows what the system, installed at each fire house, looked light; several cog wheels in that box activated the horns and bells at each firehouse.

And if there was a general alarm, someone would activate one of the Gamewell systems at either fire house with a 7, which would blow the horns in 7 bursts (and would repeat 2 more times.) If the alarm signaled a call to the Alert Fire Co., the signal would be a 13 sequence (one burst followed by three bursts), while a signal to the Minquas Fire Co. would be a 12 (one burst, followed by two bursts).

Also an alarm for an air raid would be continuously blasting of the horns at Borough Hall.
