

What was happening here 36 years ago

Noted below are items originally published in the *East Branch Citizen* in the latter part of June 1981:

- The Downingtown Area School Board revised its punishment code for students who violated the district's **drug and alcohol policies**. Penalties for students caught using or possessing drugs or alcohol on school property, on school buses, or at school activities were increased from a 20-day suspension to 30 days. Second offenders or those who caught selling or distributing drugs or alcohol were to be expelled.
- The School Board also agreed to establish **boys' and girls' swim teams as a varsity sport** at DHS. The teams would practice in the pool being built at the Brandywine YMCA, and that would be the site for home meets, as well. And the school directors recommended that the annual salary of Dr. Charles Micken, superintendent, be increased from \$53,000 to \$59,000.
- The possibility of razing the **Pennsylvania House** on West Lancaster Avenue in Downingtown was being discussed by Herbert Balian, owner of the three-story structure since 1971, and borough officials. The vacant building was the target of vandalism and unfit for habitation since it was severely damaged by a February 1981 fire. The original part of the building served as a tavern until 1848, when it became the Pennsylvania House Hotel when Henry Eicholtz was the proprietor. And President Lincoln's funeral train stopped at the hotel to refuel at the railroad station next door. In recent times, the site had stores on the ground floor and apartments on the upper floors.
- Plans to build a total of 962 townhouses in the Kings Crossing and Eaglesmere developments in **Upper Uwchlan** attracted some 60 township residents to a supervisors' meeting. The supervisors said they were opposed to the plans as well, but they were waiting for advice from "outside counsel."

- Elected as leaders of the **Downingtown Rotary Club** were Frank Brouse, president; Bruce Bredickas, first vice president; Leon Bixler, second vice president; Albert Holman, secretary; David Kirkner, treasurer; and directors Bob Cropper, Larry Reed and William Mason,
- Recent **property transfers** included: 202 Kelley Lane, Uwchlan, \$104,900; 1316 Blair Circle, West Bradford, \$72,125; 420 Church St., Downingtown, \$56,000; 543 Fairview Road, Wallace, \$56,500; 123 Clearview Drive, East Brandywine, \$66,900; 223 Westbury Court, Caln, \$49,000.
- Rod Bell and Cathy Palski set new team records as **Pennypacker Country Club swim team** beat Wagontown 318-146 in Brandywine Swim League action.
- Winners in the **4-mile road race**, sponsored by the Uwchlan Township Recreation Commission, were Mike Bizal in the senior bracket and Faith Faller in the junior division.
- Those who took first place in the **Home Run Derby** at Kerr Park were Jim Mastroianni, 8 and 9-year-olds; Scott Torrance, 10, 11 and 12-year-olds; John Hayes, 13, 13 and 15-year-olds.
- Boy Scouts from the Marshallton area, who attended the National Scout Jamboree at Fort A. P. Hill, VA, included Brian Flaherty, Ronnie Chiesa, Stephen Bowser, Greg Sleeman and John Pfeiffer, plus scoutmaster Ken Trimble.
- Winners in the bubble gum blowing competition at the **Lionville Playground** were: Tina Astwood, Edgar Tinson, Malinda Jones, Paul Nicholson, Nolan Purnel and Demaris Roy. And

softball throwing contest winners at the **Wagenseller Park Playground** in Wallace were Amy and Steve Mitchell, Jenny Kohler, Melanie Seiforth, Francine Armstrong, Heather Dillinger, Mary Jane Poluch, Renee and Rick Kacmar, Jeff and Kenny Seese, and Fred Wendig,

What locals were talking about in July 1956

Noted below are news items originally published in the Downingtown Archive 61 years ago:

- The Downingtown School Board decided to "get in line" for state aid to help finance a **new high school**. The junior-senior high school, built in 1932 on Manor Avenue, was at capacity, with an enrollment of 920 students. And there were 1,150 pupils now in the local elementary schools who were projected to be enrolled at DHS in 1961. And that projection didn't include inevitable growth created by new residents moving into the Downingtown area.
- The end of manual telephone service came to an end in Downingtown, and **a direct dial system** was introduced. No longer did a Bell Telephone operator ask, "Number please," when a call was put through.
- Downingtown area **beauticians** increased their prices to \$1.75 for a shampoo and a finger wave, and to \$1.25 for a haircut.
- Robert Plank was elected president of the **Downingtown Rotary Club**. Also elected were Robert Piersol, vice president; Clarence Dorsey, secretary; and Edward McCausland, treasurer.
- A **community band** was being formed by the Downingtown School District and the borough's Kerr Park Commission. William Ifert and Joe Poltrone were the co-directors.
- Downingtown's **summer recreation program** was underway, with Mary Jane Bird running the East Ward School playground and Thelma Heller in charge of the playground at West Ward School.
- Glenmoore Brownies who attended day camp were Susy Houck, Norma Howe, Bonnie Moore, Cathy Bingaman, Nancy and Mary Ann Harple, Jean Reisling, Sandra Strickland and Jill Loomis.
- Employment at **Beloit-Eastern** had increased from 265 workers to more than 500 employees in the past six months. The firm purchased a 4.5-acre tract on Lincoln Avenue in Downingtown, from Ellis King, so there would be more parking space for employees.
 - The **Exton Drive-in** movie theatre opened on Route 100.
- The 18-hole golf course at **Whitford Country Club** was being built, at a projected cost of \$400,000.



All we know about Coral Hall is that it was used as a public meeting place in the late 19th Century. Many local residents remember the building as the location of Hutchison's Rexall Drug Store for much of the 20th Century. Currently, it's the home of Downingtown Youth Meditation, Candy Vigorita's All State Insurance Agency and Commonwealth Engineers Inc .
